That said, all the same steps will still apply if you want to search the Irwin Law Books Archive instead. Once we click on Irwin Law Books, we will wait for the full list of titles to load.

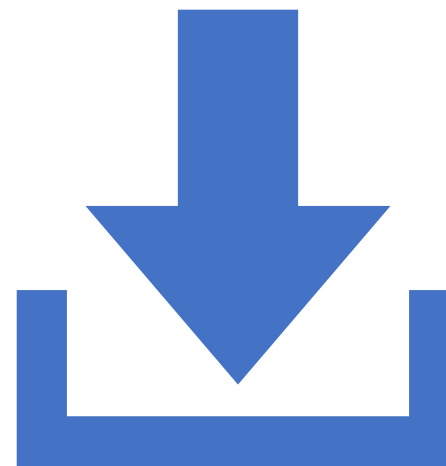
COMMENTARY: Instead of clicking on View All, it is best to wait for the full list of titles to load. Once the list loads, you can use Ctrl + F to find a specific book. In the example above, we used Ctrl + F to find The Law of Torts, which is highlighted in orange above.



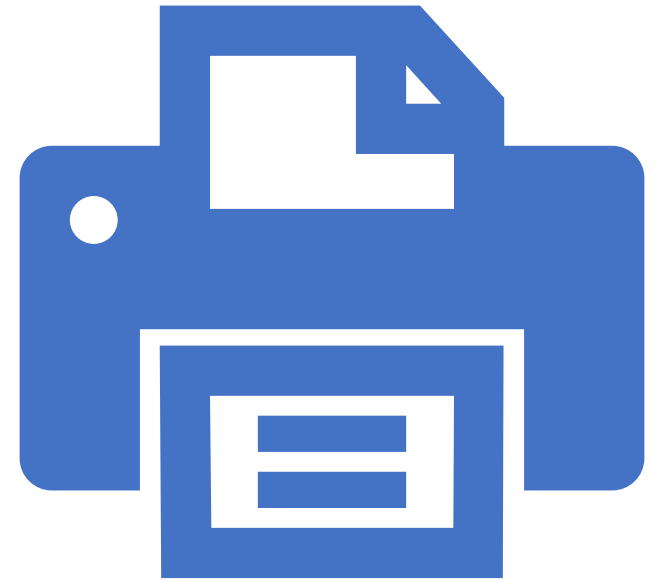

COMMENTARY: Microsoft Print to PDF will allow you to save a PDF to your device. If you instead need to print a hard copy, then make sure that your local printer is selected.

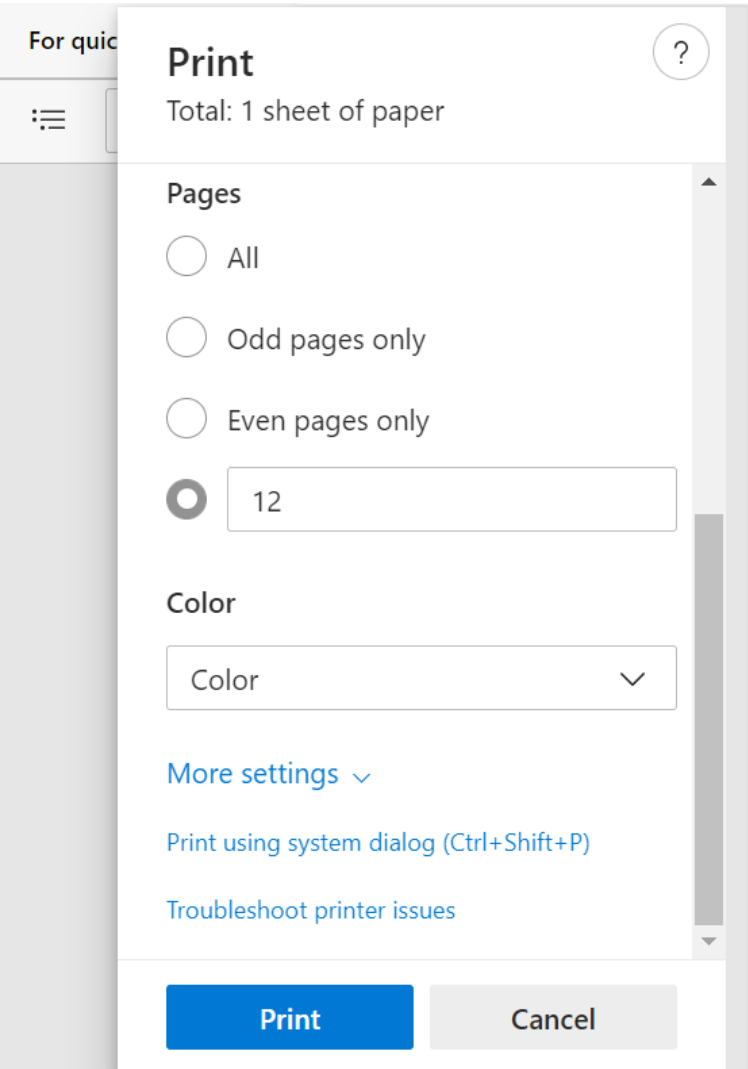

It should be noted that the word "false" in false imprisonment is misleading. The plaintiff is required only to prove a direct imprisonment. "False" suggests that it was unjustified because of a lack of consent or legal authority to imprison. These are, however, defences that must be proved by the defendant. The defendant also carries the burden of showing that her actions were neither intentional nor negligent.

COMMENTARY: The moment you start scrolling you will see a speech bubble with a number in it. This number corresponds to the actual page number from the book itself. If we wanted to save a copy of page 276 for example, we would need to type 12 into the box that currently says "e.g. 1-5, 8, 11-13."

4) Malicious Prosecution

The tort of malicious prosecution reflects a delicate balance between two important and competing interests. The first interest is the freedom of individual citizens from groundless criminal prosecutions that may result in damage to their reputation, a loss of liberty, and financial
